Japanese Refresher Course for Teachers 2013

A free 2.5-day intensive language course for teachers who want to improve their Japanese







Intermediate Course Dates: August 19th (10:00-17:00), 20th (10:00-17:00) and 21st (10:00-13:00) Advanced Course Dates: August 21st (14:00-17:00), 22nd (10:00-17:00), 23rd (10:00-17:00)

Course theme: 「話すことを教える」Teaching spoken Japanese

The aim of this course is for teachers to study Japanese teaching methods while at the same time brushing up on their Japanese ability by trying out real-life teaching activities. In this course, we will explore how to teach Japanese conversation, including pronunciation.

This course will be held at two levels:

- 1. Intermediate: Suitable for people who have an approximate Japanese proficiency of B1 level in the JF Standard for Japanese Language Education.
- 2. Advanced: Suitable for people who have an approximate Japanese proficiency of B2 level in the JF Standard for Japanese Language Education and above.

Please see the 'Self assessment grid' overleaf for more details. We will talk more about the JF Standard during the course.

The course is open to all **non-native speaking teachers of Japanese**, **as well as teachers and PGCE students who have the chance to offer Japanese in future.** Priority will be given to those based in primary and secondary schools. The course is free, but participants must cover their own travel, accommodation and lunch costs.
