Japanese Language Championship for Young Learners UK

Application Guideline



1. Aims

The world is changing very quickly. Technology is advancing, and nowadays if you have a computer or a smartphone you can send a message to anyone in the world. In a time like this, we should always consider the following questions: “What message do I want to convey and how?” Using your voice, the written word, visuals, design and more – there are many ways to express your message. It is important to be able to combine these different choices of expression to create a way of expressing yourself that others can understand, empathise with or be persuaded by.

This event is a contest for primary and secondary school students studying Japanese in the United Kingdom. The aim is to encourage you, the students, to use your Japanese and present your thoughts, views, ideas and messages. There are two categories - the speech category, and the video category, where you are asked to create an original video based on the theme provided. You choose the category you like and apply. For video category, you can apply individually or as part of a group.

2. Categories and Eligibility Criteria

Primary and secondary school students studying Japanese in the United Kingdom are eligible. Please see the eligibility criteria for each category in the table below. For more details, please read the guidelines for each category.

B1 Level: Can talk in a straightforward and prepared way about a familiar theme, describing what you have researched or found out, or what you thought about it.

4. Finals Day

Speech Category

In the Speech Category, secondary school students studying Japanese as a foreign language are asked to give a speech on a theme of their choice where they express their thoughts, messages, and any points they would particularly like to emphasise.

1. Eligibility

The applicant must meet all of the following conditions to be eligible for this category:

- Those who are secondary school students studying Japanese in the UK
(Students studying outside of a secondary school setting, such as at a Saturday school or with a private tutor, are also able to apply)
- Those who have a **Japanese level equivalent to B1 level** of standard for Japanese-language Education /CEFR (**Post-GCSE level**).*
- Those who have **NOT** spent a total of 6 months or more in Japan since birth.
- Those who were **NOT** born in Japan.
- Those who have **NO** family members who are Japanese native speakers and do **NOT** use Japanese as family language at home.

B1 Level: Can talk in a Straightforward and prepared way about a familiar theme, describing what you have researched or found out, or what you thought about it.

2. Speech theme and length

Theme: Any

- The speech should have a title.
- You should also be clear about the points you want to raise and express your own views on why you want to deliver them.

Length: Between 4 minutes and 5 minutes

Important: - It is prohibited to create a speech as a group. Please write and present your speech on your own.

- Please note that **speeches which don't follow the guidelines will be disqualified.**

3. Judging Criteria

The speeches will be judged based on the following points. Details of the judging decisions will not be made public.

Criteria		Description
1	Originality of the theme	Whether the theme is original, whether it expresses one's own ideas and viewpoints, and whether the title matches the content.
2	Structure of the speech	Whether the structure is persuasive or encourages audience sympathy.
3	Japanese	Pronunciation and fluency
		Grammar and vocabulary (accuracy, appropriateness, range of use)
4	Presentation skill	Whether the speaker engages the audience (e.g. volume of voice, pauses, eye contact, gestures, etc.)
5	Q&A	Whether the speaker can interact with the interlocutor (with the same level of as in the speech transcript).

4. How to apply

(1) For students applying:

Please prepare for the following two files and share them with your Japanese language teacher.

① Sound file of your speech

Format: MP3

File name: 'YOUR SURNAME_SCHOOL NAME'

E.g. 'Smith_Brookes' if your name is M Smith and your school is Brookes School.

② Script of speech in Japanese

Format: Microsoft Word, PDF, or a scan of a handwritten script

File name: 'YOUR SURNAME_SCHOOL NAME'

E.g. 'Smith_Brookes' if your name is M Smith and your school is Brookes School.

Language: Japanese

*If you are studying with a private tutor or at a Saturday school etc, you should ask your teacher to submit your application. You should also notify a teacher at your secondary school letting them know that you are entering this contest.

(2) For teachers of Japanese:

In the video category, students are asked to create a video according to a set theme, either individually or as part of a group. We want to encourage you to show us your creativity in full and have fun making your video!

1. Divisions and eligibility criteria

- Primary and secondary school students studying Japanese in the United Kingdom may enter.
- Students studying Japanese outside of school, students who have lived in Japan in the past, and students who speak Japanese at home can all apply.
- Students can apply individually or as part of a group (group size is 6 students maximum)! * A whole class working together can also submit videos for the Primary Division (no maximum number of students)!
- There are three divisions as below:

2. Judging criteria

The videos will be judged based on the following criteria. If the Japanese in the video is as per the level described under each division, the applicant can score full points for those criteria. Details of the judging decisions will not be made public.

[Primary Division]

Criteria	Description
Structure (30%)	The content of the video is well balanced and effectively presented within the time limit. The structure of the video is well thought out and the content is not inadequate.
Interpretation & originality of the theme (40%)	Thoughtful consideration of the theme and selection of the places featured in the video. The content of the video expresses the applicant's own personality.
Japanese (30%)	Not necessarily fluent, and with some vocabulary and grammatical errors, but with a good understanding of what you want to express.

[Secondary Division]

Criteria	Description	
Structure (25%)	The content of the video is well balanced and effectively presented within the time limit. The structure of the video is well thought out and the content is not inadequate.	
Visual expression & editing (25%)	Great effort has been made in the visual expression and editing of the video, including the use of scene changes, special effects, sound, font, colour and placement of subtitles and titles, as well as the use of voices.	
Interpretation & originality of the theme (25%)	[Secondary Division-1] Thoughtful interpretation of the theme. Selection of the content featured in the video, detailed explanations, and the reason why you like them, are convincing. The content of the video expresses the applicant's own personality.	[Secondary Division-2] Thoughtful interpretation of the theme, with a good deal of research and consideration. The point of view is unique and shows the student's or students' own individuality.
Japanese (25%)	Not necessarily fluent, with some vocabulary and grammatical errors, but with a good understanding of what you want to express.	Research and ideas are presented in a clear and well-sequenced way. Despite some grammatical errors, pronunciation is clear, relatively fluent and easy to listen to. Has enough vocabulary and expressions to communicate what they want to convey.

3. General guidelines

Videos should be created according to the following guidelines. **Videos that do not follow these guidelines will be disqualified.**

3.1 Format and Style

- Please make sure your video is within the specified time limit for your division.
- You can make your video in whatever style you prefer – presentation style, a dramatic skit, using photos and animation etc.
- Make sure to give your video **a title** and show that title somewhere in the video.
- Make sure to **include credits** at the end of your video (school name, names of those who made the video etc). The credits count towards the total time of the video, so please make sure the video is within the time limit. For further information about credits, please refer to 3.4.
- Please submit the videos as MP4 files.

3.2 Language

- The video must contain the voice or voices of someone/multiple people speaking in Japanese.
- Please **include English subtitles.**

3.3 Makers of the video

- Videos made by individuals or groups are both accepted.
- You cannot be involved in more than one submitted video. In essence, one person cannot participate in multiple group videos, or one person cannot submit both an individual video and a group video.
- If you are a primary or secondary school student and fulfil the eligibility criteria laid out in Section 2, you can take part. Students born in Japan or who have lived in Japan can also take part.
- For the primary school division, teachers of Japanese can help pupils to create the video. For the secondary school divisions, students must be responsible for creating the video without aid from their teacher.
 - * It is essential that applications are made through a teacher of Japanese. If you are studying Japanese outside of school, please notify a teacher at your school about your application to the contest.

(1) Applying as an individual:

- Please make your video on your own. Your family etc can record you speaking or doing actions.

(2) Applying as a group:

- Maximum number in each group:
 - **Primary Division:** videos made by **an entire class are eligible**
 - **Secondary Division:** groups should consist up to a **maximum of 6 students**
- Group members must be from the same school. If you study Japanese outside of school (such as at a Saturday school), you may make a video with those you are studying Japanese with.

- Students in the group may be in different year groups. However, university students are not permitted to take part, and primary and secondary school students cannot take part in the same groups.
- A student who is not studying Japanese may participate. In essence, a student who does not speak Japanese may be a group member. Group members can work together based on their individual skills at filmmaking, editing and so on, to create the video.
- Be sure to give your group a group name.
- Make sure **to include in the credits:** group name, each group member's name or nickname, and their role in the group. For further information about the credits, please refer to 3.4.

3.4 Credit

- Make sure to include following information in the credits:
 - a) **School name**
 - If you study Japanese with a private tutor, please put the name of your full-time primary or secondary school.
 - If you study Japanese at a Saturday school etc please put the name of the school where you study Japanese and the name of your full-time primary or secondary school.
 - b) **Group name** (if applying in a group)
 - c) **All applicant names and their respective roles**
 - You may use nicknames.
 - If you are applying as a primary school class, you do not have to put every participant's name in the credits.
 - d) Please be **sure to credit any background music, images, and quotes** (if any)

✂As stated in 3.1, you must make sure to display the title somewhere in your video.

To Teachers:

- There is no limit as to how many videos a single school can submit. We hope to receive many applications.
- Please refer to Section 4 (“How to apply”) of this document when applying.
- Please obtain permission from the parent or guardian of the student/s applying.
- If the student is selected as a finalist, we will send a consent form to be signed by their parent or guardian, which must then be returned to The Japan Foundation, London.

3.5 Copyright and portrait Rights

- Music, photos, illustrations and so on made by people other than yourself will have copyright. If you would like to add background music to your video, then make sure to use Royalty Free or Creative Commons license for attribution (BY) and non-commercial use music.
 - * **Please do not use material from animation, comics, television or film.**
- People's photos or images will have portrait rights. When making your video, make sure to only include the faces of the group members and no one else, OR you may feature the faces of other people as long as you have received permission from them.
- You may not use company, group or brand logos without consent. If you are filming in an area such as a shop or café, please obtain permission from the staff there.
- In the event of problems arising related to copyright or portrait rights, the Japan Foundation accepts no responsibility.
- If you have any questions or concerns about copyright or image rights, please talk to teachers of citizenship studies, design and technology, and/or any other related subjects.
