Ms Mara Yamauchi



Mara Yamauchi is a former elite athlete and diplomat. She grew up in Kenya, later living in Oxford, UK, where she attended school and university. She had a dream to become a top athlete at age 11 but did not know how. After leaving education, she worked for the Foreign Office, including learning Japanese and working in the British Embassy, Tokyo. In 2006, she became a full-time athlete. She finished sixth in the 2008 Beijing Olympics women's marathon, won the 2008 Osaka Marathon, and won bronze over 10,000m at the 2006 Commonwealth Games. She now works self-employed as a coach, commentator and writer. Her book, Marathon Wisdom, was published in 2022.







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
