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幸せの再定義:フィンランドからの視点

世界一幸せな国といえば、何を思い浮かべるだろうか。その国での生活はどのようなものだろうか。必要なものがすべて揃い、笑顔があふれ、あまり心配することなく晴れた日を楽しんでいるような場所を思い浮かべるかもしれない。

私の母国フィンランドは、2023 年現在、世界の幸福度ランキングで 6 回連続で最も幸せな国と評価されている。しかし、初めてフィンランドを訪れた外国人は、一年の半分が寒冷な気候で暗く、ほとんど笑顔を見せない人々に直面し、ショックを受けることが多い。では、どうしてフィンランド人は世界一幸せなのだろうか。このランキングには多くの優れた理由があるが、最大の理由の一つは人々の自己認識と人生に対するユニークなアプローチだと考えている。

本講演では、フィンランドの視点から幸福の本質に焦点を当て、私の研究結果や経験を共有することで、幸福とは何かを再定義し、他国、特に日本との比較を通して幸福についての新たな視点を提供したいと思っている。フィンランドの幸福の秘密を解き明かし、幸福とは何か、そしてどうすれば誰もが幸福になれるのか、一緒に考えていきたいと思う。

Happiness Redefined: A Finnish Perspective

When you think of the happiest country in the world, what comes to mind? What does life in that country look like? You might think of a place where people have everything they need, are full of smiling faces, and enjoy sunny days without worrying too much.

As of 2023, my home country of Finland has been rated the happiest country in the world for six consecutive years in the world happiness rankings. However, foreigners who visit Finland for the first time are often shocked to be confronted with a cold, dark climate half of the year and people who rarely smile. So why are Finns the happiest people in the world? There are many great reasons for this ranking, but I believe one of the biggest reasons is people's self-awareness and unique approach to life.

In this speech, I will focus on the nature of happiness from a Finnish perspective and attempt to redefine what happiness means by sharing the results of my research and experiences and offer new perspectives on happiness through comparisons with other countries, especially Japan. Together we will uncover the secrets of Finnish happiness and consider what happiness is and how anyone can achieve it.

若者の沈黙: 日本における対話と政治参加の促進

日本の政治状況における最大の問題の一つは、投票率の世代間格差である。高齢化社会と、遅れた政治的メンタリティが相まって、日本の若者の政治への関心は低い。若者の政治参加を奨励するため、政府は選挙権年齢の引き下げなどを試みましたが、変わらず30歳未満の投票率が40%を下回る一方で、50歳以上の投票率は70%前後である。しかし、すべての人に利益をもたらす社会と未来を創造するためには、投票することが重要だ。この問題には様々な原因がある。第一に、以前の世代に比べて若者がメディアを通じて政治に触れる機会が少ないこと。第二に、若者は投票することを自分の責任だと思っていないこと、そして最後に、自分の一票が影響力を持っていないと感じている。これは多くの国で見られる問題だが、ベルギーのように義務投票制などによって高い投票率を維持している国もある。ベルギー人の多くには、投票することは当たり前のことであり、文化の一部として見られている。日本では義務投票制を導入するのは難しいだろうが、初回義務投票制が解決策になるかもしれない。つまり、18歳になって最初の選挙で投票を義務化するということだ。同時に、学校のカリキュラムに政治や投票について学ぶ機会を増やさなければならない。これにより、若者は投票するだけでなく、日本の政治環境に適切に参加するために必要なスキルを身につけることができる。

The Silence of the Youth: Fostering Dialogue and Political Engagement in Japan

One of the biggest problems in the Japanese political landscape is the gap between generations in voter turnout rate: the youth stay silent. The combination of a fast-aging society and the outdated political mentality has led to a high disinterest in politics among the Japanese youth. However, it is important to vote to create a society and future that fits everyone. Even though the government has made some attempts to involve them, by notably lowering the legal voting age, the voter turnout rate for citizens under 30 is below 40% while for citizens above 50 it is around 70%. There are multiple aspects to this problem. Firstly, the lack of political exposure from the youth through the media, compared to previous generations. Secondly, the youth doesn't see voting as their responsibility, and lastly, they are disillusioned by their impact when voting. Although this is a problem across many countries, some countries have managed to keep a high voter turnout rate through, for example, compulsory voting, such as Belgium. For a vast majority of Belgians voting is a given and is part of the culture. Although introducing complete compulsory voting in Japan would be a challenge, an idea could be to introduce first-time compulsory voting at 18. However, this must go hand in hand with education campaigns that add more opportunities to learn about politics and voting in the school curriculum. Through this the youth does not only learn to vote but can also develop the necessary skills to properly partake in the Japanese political environment.

日本におけるエネルギー自給率問題

日本のエネルギー自給率は先進国の中で2番目に低い。その要因は何か。また、今後どのように対処していったらいいのだろうか。

2011年の福島第一原発事故直後、日本政府はすべての原子炉を閉鎖し、もともと少ない天然資源の石油及び石炭へ移行せざるを得なかった。そのため、自給率は2010年の20.2%から2012年の6.7%に低下した。しかし、再生可能エネルギー使用の増加及び原子炉再稼働のおかげで、2021年にはエネルギー自給率は13.3%まで回復した。

とはいえ、改善の余地は多大にあるだろう。

再生可能エネルギー使用の増加は増加が継続すると、間違いなくエネルギー自給率も上昇する。しかし、将来的に日本は再生可能エネルギーの地理的な条件が整っていないため、持続可能とは言い難い。

しかし、発展する可能性の高い再生可能エネルギー源は地熱発電である。日本は地熱ホットスポットの多い国にもかかわらず、日本の再生可能エネルギーの 1.54%にすぎない。しかし、現在の利用率は 2.5%であるため、地熱発電を発展すると自給率が上昇する。

福島第一原発事故の後で、全国の原子力発電所管理に対する規則及び法律が強化されたため原子力は怖いものではないということが明らかになってきている。強化された安全管理のもとで原子力を再開し、地熱発電やバイオマスなど、新しい形のサステナブルな再生可能エネルギーを取り入れることを提言する。これにより、CO2 排出の減少もエネルギー自給率問題の解決も実現することができ、一石二鳥といえよう。

Japan's Energy Self-sufficiency Problem

Japan's energy self-sufficiency rate is one of the lowest among developed countries, but how did it get to be that way and what does this mean for Japan going forward?

In the wake of the 2011 Fukushima nuclear accident, all nuclear reactors nationwide were shut down. This caused the self-sufficiency rate to plummet from 20.2% in 2010 to a new low of 6.7% 2012 as Japan transitioned towards coal and oil, resources of which the country naturally has few. However, thanks to a new push for renewables and nuclear reactivation, we have seen a rebound to 13.3% in 2021.

However, this is still severely low, so where does this leave Japan as it looks towards the future?

If the current move to renewables continues as it has for the last 10 years, we will likely continue to see improvements in self-sufficiency. Yet eventually, there will likely come a plateau in the future, as Japan's geography is unsuited to current renewable technologies.

However, one source of renewable energy in Japan remains a goldmine of untapped potential, that being geothermal energy. Despite Japan being a hotbed of geothermal activity, it makes up only 1.54% of the country's renewable energy production. It is estimated that this is a mere 2.5% of Japan's possible geothermal output.

With enhanced security protocols and regulations in the wake of the Fukushima accident, it is becoming clear that nuclear power should not be a scary subject. I propose that nuclear power's restarting continue under strengthened safety measures, as well as including new forms of sustainable energy, such as geothermal and biomass. This could thus allow the government to both decrease carbon emissions and increase the nation's self-sufficiency rate, killing two birds with one stone.

日本と韓国:友好関係を築く「対話」カ

日本と韓国の間では既に活発な交流が行われているが、果たして本当にそれが両国間の関係発展に繋がったと言えるだろうか。確かに、両国間の不和は表面的には改善しているように見えるが、今の状態では深い友好関係が築けているとは言い難い。

一つの解決策は、お互いに共有している複雑な歴史についての「対話」を積極的に交わすことだと考える。私が言う「対話」は善悪を決める手段ではなく、心を開いてセンシティブで難しい話題について素直に話したり、聞いたりする相互理解のコミュニケーションである。つまり、一方的な発言や思い込みとは違い、「対話」には相手の立場を理解し、極めて根深い誤解さえも減らす効果があるのだ。

残念ながら、この「対話」は、政府間はもとより、個人レベルでもあまり行われていない。例えば、私は留学中広島と長崎を訪れた後、日本人の友達や知り合いに戦争や歴史について意見を聞きたかったが、何だか話しにくかった。歴史や政治的な重い話はタブーに感じたからだ。日本人と深い「対話」ができなかったため、日本で「韓国が好きだ」と聞く度に喜びだけではなく違和感があった。

帰国して半年も経った現在でも、どうすればこの「対話」ができるようになるのか考え続けている。そこで、私はこの場を借り、韓国人学生として日本と今まではあまりできなかった「対話」を始めたい。聴衆の皆さんをはじめ、世界中の人々に、一見単純なようだが、実は平和の架け橋を作るのに不可欠な「対話」を始めることを提案する。

歴史は変えられないものだが、「対話」によって未来はまだ変えられる。

Japan and South Korea: Building a Stronger Relationship through the Power of Dialogue

As neighbours in East Asia, Japan, and South Korea are actively engaged with each other. This, however, has not led to real improvement in the relations between the two countries. In fact, behind the façade lurch past troubles and the lack of deep, genuine friendship.

I propose that one solution to this is to encourage more *dialogue* about the complex history shared by the two nations. The purpose of this dialogue should not be to determine who is right or wrong. Rather, it should be about striving for mutual understanding by talking honestly about and actively listening to sensitive and difficult issues. Unlike one-sided statements and assumptions, such dialogue enables the parties involved to understand the position of one another better and overcome even the most deep-rooted misunderstandings.

Unfortunately, there is a shortage of dialogue between the governments of Japan and South Korea, as well as at an individual level. For example, after visiting Hiroshima and Nagasaki last year, I was curious about my Japanese friends' opinions on war and history. Such topics, however, were difficult to bring up. Precisely because of this difficulty, whenever I was told 'I like South Korea' in Japan, the initial feeling of joy quickly morphed into awkwardness and inner dilemma.

More than half a year has passed since I returned to the UK, but I have continued to think about how to initiate this dialogue. As a South Korean student, I decided to use this opportunity offered by this speech contest to begin an open *dialogue* with Japan. I realised that something seemingly as simple as communication is, in fact, essential to building a truly peaceful future for both Japan and South Korea.

The past cannot be changed, but dialogue can help change the future. That is the power of dialogue.

不寛容の時代における「公案」の価値

我々は不寛容の時代を生きている。地球温暖化や極貧、コロナ禍後の社会課題等に対して、世界のいたると ころで政治的意見の分極という傾向が続いており、どのように一つの社会で異なる見解を持っている他者と共 に暮せばよいかに関する議論が加速している。

然し、不確定な未来に直面しているのは、現代が最初ではない。戦闘が継続的であり、飢饉や地震、疫病等といった災害が少なからずあった中世の時代には、禅僧が、現在に至るまで受け継がれてきた伝統を創り上げた。それが、「公案」である。

公案というのは、禅師の生涯にまつわるエピソード及びそれに対する注釈書をさし、日本の臨済宗の中では、 特に座禅に深く関係しているものである。そのエピソードは難問や矛盾している言明の形式となることが多く、 禅宗では物事の本質を明らかにして悟りを開くための不可欠な手段とされている。

中世の公案は現代にどのような関係があるのだろうか。また、どこまで仏教の教えである公案を現代の社会的・政治的問題に適用できるのだろうか。本スピーチでは、「公案」が、儀式や教義であるのみならず、現代でも様々な分野に適用可能な考え方であると主張したい。具体的に言えば、公案からわかる教訓として、表面的な矛盾の解決方法や冷静な判断の重要性、イデオロギーの空性という三つの教訓を挙げて論じていくことを目的とする。

Kōan in an age of intolerance

We live in an age of intolerance. On issues ranging from climate change to poverty and the social impacts of the coronavirus pandemic, societies around the world are witnessing a profound polarisation of public opinion and discourse, and as a result the debate on how, as fellow citizens, we can and should live alongside those with different worldviews to our own continues apace.

However, it would be wrong to say that ours is the first age to face such incessant instabilities. Buddhist monks of the fractious Medieval Period of Japanese history confronted similar existential threats, and in response to that era's internecine warfare, famine and natural disasters developed a ritual tradition that continues to survive to this day; the *kōan*.

Kōan is a term of art of Zen Buddhism, designating the practice of commentary on episodes excerpted from the biographies of Zen patriarchs, and in the Japanese Rinzai sect is particularly closely associated with the practice of zazen (seated meditation). These episodes typically take the form of a challenging puzzle or superficially contradictory statement, the contemplation of which is considered within the Zen tradition an indispensable instrument towards the discovery of the true nature of existence and the reaching of enlightenment.

What connection could $k\bar{o}an$ have to contemporary society, and how might this medieval tradition be adapted to the social and political problems of our age? In this speech I shall contend that the $k\bar{o}an$ should be considered not merely a ritual tradition or religious dogma, but a way of thinking - a philosophy of social conduct applicable even centuries after its first formulation. In particular, I shall propose and explain three moral lessons relevant to the problems of contemporary social discourse that I believe might be drawn from the $k\bar{o}an$; the superficiality of contradiction, the importance of dispassionate judgement, and the fundamental emptiness of political ideology.

Presentation Abstract:

Chinese characters are primarily monosyllabic, but a type of Chinese ligature 合書 produces polysyllabic characters. It combines two or more characters in an idiom to form a single character, while retaining the original meaning and pronunciation of the idiom. Although these polysyllabic characters are not recognised as formal words, they are commonly seen in daily lives and have a long history. This type of ligature dates back to the 17th century BC, and over time people have been using it for different purposes. Creating this ligature not only requires spatial thinking, but also a deep understanding of the characters.
